2B. Experience of Applicant, Subrecipient(s), and Other Partners

1. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) experience in effectively utilizing federal funds and performing the activities proposed in the application.

Miriam’s House (MH) has a 30-year history of effectively using federal funds and performing the activities proposed in applications. In 1994, through a HUD grant, MH opened a transitional housing program which converted to a permanent supportive housing program in 2017. In 2008, MH became the HMIS Lead for the CoC, in 2013 launched a CoC-funded rapid re-housing (RRH) program, in 2017 became the CoC Collaborative Applicant, in 2018 launched a street outreach program and in 2022 launched a CoC-funded permanent supportive housing program for chronically homeless persons. The Housing First model has been adopted across all MH programs. All barriers to program admission such as drug testing, sobriety requirements, treatment compliance, and criminal background have been eliminated since 2011. MH has implemented harm reduction strategies to increase program retention and exits to permanent housing. All programs employ a voluntary service model where clients’ participation in services is not required and does not impact their housing. All MH case managers receive training in best practices such as motivational interviewing, conflict resolution, harm reduction, critical time intervention and housing-focused case management strategies. Recognizing that many of our clients have experienced trauma, including the trauma of homelessness, our staff provide trauma-informed services. MH currently manages five CoC federal grants and two state homeless response grants. In our 30-year history of receiving CoC Competition funding, MH has always drawn down on a regular basis, never returned grants funds and has had no findings on an audit or monitoring visit. MH receives funding through the Emergency Solutions Grant Program provided to Virginia through the Virginia Homeless Solutions Program and has effectively used funds to perform the activities proposed in the application, monthly submitted funding requests and have had no findings on monitoring visits. For all federal grants, MH has had to provide a 25% match which we are always successful in securing. We have an endowment from which we draw down operating funds for programs each year as well as a robust fundraising program aimed at increasing our access to state, local and private sector funds. The endowment housed at the Greater Lynchburg Community Trust valued at more than 2 million dollars and allows an annual 5% payout based on a 12 quarter rolling average. This annual payout provides match for our homeless response programs through the CoC Program. The financial management system used by both the Director of Administration and Finance Manager is QuickBooks.

2. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) experience in leveraging Federal, State, local and private sector funds.

Miriam's House acquired its property at 409 Magnolia Street, Lynchburg, VA through the Low Income Housing Tax Credit Program and has provided low income housing for the past 30 years. In addition to receiving funds through the CoC Competition, MH receives state funds through the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development's Virginia Homeless Solutions Program (partially funded through ESG) and the Virginia Housing Trust Fund. MH is also a recipient of Community Development Block Grant funds, Emergency Food and Shelter National Board Program, and Homeless Education Program funds. Within the private sector, MH receives funds from multiple corporate foundations such as Genworth, Pacific Life, Wells Fargo and Truist. MH also receives funds from local grantmaking bodies such as the Centra Health Foundation and the Greater Lynchburg Community Foundation, in addition to support from churches, community-based organizations and individual donors. Annually MH manages almost \$500,000 in public funds and \$700,000 in private. All funding supports the mission of MH to end homelessness and rebuild lives.

3. Describe your organization’s (and subrecipient(s) if applicable) financial management structure.

Miriam’s House (MH) is governed by a 20-member board of directors comprised of professionals from a variety of backgrounds including financial planners, lawyers, clergy, medical professionals, college professors, human resource professionals, business owners and many others. The board develops and reviews the following organizational policies: Conflict of Interest Policy, Grievance Policy, Whistleblower Policy, and Fair Housing Policy. In addition, a Consumer Advisory Council comprised of formerly homeless individuals provides quarterly feedback on organizational decisions. The leadership at MH includes an Executive Director, a Director of Housing Services, a Director of Administration and Community Engagement and a Finance Manager. The HUD Richmond Field Office, the Monitoring and Evaluation Committee of the CoC and the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development have conducted grant audits which have reflected program compliance and sound fiscal management. To ensure adequate financial accounting, MH employs a Finance Manager with oversight provided by the Executive Director, Finance Committee of the Board and an annual external audit through an independent CPA firm. The ED, Finance Manager, Board Treasurer and Finance Committee annually update the organization’s Financial Policies and Procedures to ensure financial best practices. The Board receives monthly financial statements indicating income and expenses during the past month. The Board Treasurer monthly monitors the organization’s checking account, credit card use and other financial statements. The Finance Manager uses Quickbooks as the accounting software which allows division of funds according to grant source. The Finance Manager has provided technical assistance to other HUD recipients in our CoC at the request of our local HUD field office.

3B. Project Description

1. Provide a description that addresses the entire scope of the proposed project.

This project will provide supportive services to chronically homeless persons who have been prioritized for an Emergency Housing Voucher, Mainstream Voucher or Project Based Voucher through the CoC's coordinated entry system but who do not have access to supportive services. Within the CoC's geographic area, 2 housing authorities were awarded 108 Mainstream Vouchers & 30 Emergency Housing Vouchers. Additionally, there are 16 Project Based Vouchers set aside for chronically homeless persons. These voucher programs are part of the CoC's coordinated entry process which prioritizes chronically homeless persons. All 3 voucher programs have rental assistance support for this population but don't have a budget for supportive services. Currently a CoC project, Central Virginia Supportive Housing, provides supportive services for 10 of the participants. This project would provide supportive services for an additional 12 chronically homeless persons over the course of a grant year. Through the coordinated entry system, it will be assessed which chronically homeless persons with a voucher are without supportive services & have high service needs.

Funding for this project will provide partial salary for a full time housing case manager (HCM). This project will be fully integrated into the coordinated entry system to ensure transparency and fairness in the referral and enrollment process. Supportive services provided by the HCM will include assessment of service needs, case management, assistance with food access, mainstream benefit enrollment, life skills training, employment assistance, transportation & housing search and counseling. The HCM will leverage partnerships with other organizations to ensure participants have access to child care, education services, legal services, mental health services, outpatient health services, substance treatment services and other services identified by the participant as being important to ensure housing stability. These services will be provided from a Housing First approach, will use a voluntary service model, voluntary enrollment in supportive services and enact harm reduction strategies.

There will be no delay in launching this project as the voucher programs are already underway and the Continuum of Care and MH have strong working relationships with the two housing authorities in the region. Additionally, MH already operates supportive housing programs and has the infrastructure in place such as program policies, forms, supervision and training opportunities. A qualified supportive housing worker could be recruited and trained within a short period of time. Anticipated project outcomes would be similar to existing MH supportive housing outcomes; 85% of participants will remain stable in housing or exit to a permanent housing situation, 65% of participants will have cash income at annual review or exit, 55% of participants will increase cash income at annual review or exit, 75% of participants will have mainstream benefits at annual review or exit and 90% of participants will be enrolled in health insurance at annual review or exit.

4A. Supportive Services for Participants

1. Describe how program participants will be assisted to obtain and remain in permanent housing.

The target participant is chronically homeless & prioritized by coordinated entry for a mainstream/emergency/PBV housing voucher. They have rental assistance but won't have a housing case manager (HCM) without this funding. Participants will have housing location assistance to obtain a private rental unit of their choosing, including landlord advocacy, application assistance, transportation to units & legal education. The HCM will communicate regularly with landlords to support lease compliance & address concerns; housekeeping, hoarding or late rent. HCMs are trained in tenant law, VAWA protections & eviction prevention strategies such as requesting reasonable accommodations. Participants will develop an individualized housing plan to identify strengths, barriers & goals. The HCM will use this tool to target referrals & provide twice monthly home visits to support housing goals; mainstream benefit/disability enrollment, employment, connection to natural supports, healthcare & mental health.

2. Describe the specific plan to coordinate and integrate with other mainstream health, social services, and employment programs for which program participants may be eligible.

Target participants for this project are chronically homeless individuals. At enrollment, each participant will be assessed for potential sources of income such as employment, disability, benefits, or a combination. Participants with employment goals will be assessed for employment barriers and skills, trainings, certifications and educational background. The Housing Case Manager (HCM) will connect participants with employment assistance agencies such as Virginia Career Works, the Department of Aging and Rehabilitative Services, Goodwill Job Center, Virginia Cares, VIEW, YouthWorks and re-entry employment programs. The HCM will assist with referral paperwork, transportation to appointments and follow up with referred programs to ensure program enrollment. The project has formed employment partnerships with area employers to ensure timely job gains, even for clients with barriers to employment such as recent felonies. The HCM will work closely with participants to develop resumes, complete applications, conduct mock interviews, and ensure that they have appropriate materials such as clothing, shoes, and equipment.

During intake, each participant will be assessed for all mainstream benefits for which they are eligible. The HCM and participant will identify a plan to obtain all benefits they are not currently receiving such as SSI, SSDI and veterans' benefits. Participants needing access to disability income will be assisted by a SOAR-trained worker on staff to gain expedited approval. The project works closely with veteran benefit enrollment partners at the VA Medical Center. The majority of social service benefits such as SNAP (food stamps), childcare assistance, Medicaid, TANF, heating/cooling assistance are accessed through Virginia's CommonHelp application portal. The HCM will assist all participants to apply for these benefits as soon as they enroll. The local Early Head Start program HumanKind prioritizes homeless households for enrollment in early childhood education services; an MOU is in place between the two organizations. SSW will leverage community food assistance such as Meals on Wheels, local food pantries and soup kitchens to ensure participants' needs are met.

The project will work with Johnson Health Center (a Federally Qualified Health Center), the Community Access Network (an FQHC Look-a-Like), and the Free Clinic of Central Virginia for clients to receive medical care. The HCM will refer to Horizon Behavioral Health (the local community services board) for mental health and recovery services. Recovery resources will be accessed through referral to Roads to Recovery, NA/AA and other peer supports. The project partners with community-based organizations to ensure clients are connected to mental health skill-building and assertive community treatment.

VAWA Budget

VAWA Budget

New in FY2023, the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) has clarified the use of CoC Program funds for VAWA eligible cost categories. These VAWA cost categories can be added to a new project application to create a CoC VAWA Budget Line Item (BLI) in e-snaps and eLOCCS. The new BLI will be added to grant agreements and utilized the same as other CoC Program BLIs in e-snaps and eLOCCS. - Security Deposits. Grant funds can be used to pay for security deposits of the safe unit the survivor is transferring to via an emergency transfer(s).
- Utilities. Grant funds can be used to pay for costs of establishing utility assistance in the safe unit the survivor is transferring to.
- Housing Fees. Grant funds can be used to pay fees associated with getting survivors into a safe unit via emergency transfer(s), including but not limited to application fees, broker fees, holding fees, trash fees, pet fees where the person believes they need their pet to be safe, etc.
- Case Management. Grant funds can be used to pay staff time necessary to assess, coordinate, and implement emergency transfer(s).
- Housing Navigation. Grant funds can be used to pay staff time necessary to identify safe units and facilitate moves into housing for survivors through emergency transfer(s).
- Technology to make an available unit safe. Grant funds can be used to pay for technology that the individual believes is needed to make the unit safe, including but not limited to doorbell cameras, security systems, phone, and internet service when necessary to support security systems for the unit, etc.

B. VAWA Confidentiality Requirements. Examples of eligible costs for ensuring compliance with VAWA confidentiality requirements include:

- Monitoring and evaluating compliance.
- Developing and implementing strategies for corrective actions and remedies to ensure compliance.
- Program evaluation of confidentiality policies, practices, and procedures.
- Training on compliance with VAWA confidentiality requirements.
- Reporting to CoC Collaborative Applicant, HUD, and other interested parties on compliance with VAWA confidentiality requirements.
- Costs for establishing methodology to protect survivor information.
- Staff time associated with maintaining adherence to VAWA confidentiality requirements.
